• Little known Constitution of Pylyp Orlyk: separation of executive/judicial/legislative powers anticipated Montesquieu by four decades – Hetman restrained, Cossack parliament. It's a great way to connect Ukrainian political history with Western narrative.

Themes to discuss in lectures

- Comparative study for instance, contrasts European/Global South/Russian/US views on Ukraine to elucidate a better understanding of conflict dynamics. Does the Ukrainian case have parallels?
 - o BUT: How do we centralise the Ukrainian perspective?
- Literature: Alfred Stepan, 'Ukraine: Improbable Democratic "Nation-State", but Possible Democratic "State-Nation"?' → excellent overview of Ukraine's politics
- Focus on stories: the Russian Tsar didn't let Taras Shevchenko paint or write an illustration of the oppression of the Ukrainian nation.
